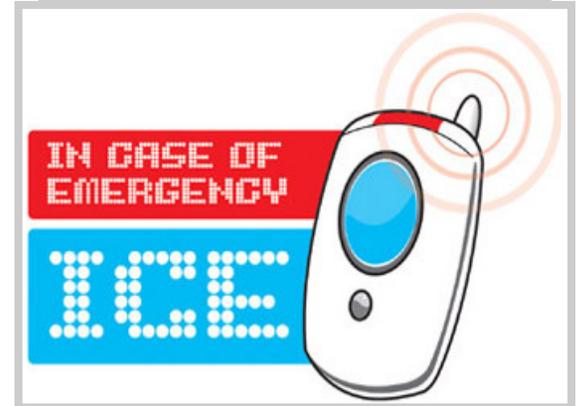

In the **NAME** section:
Enter **ICE**.

In the **NUMBER** section:
Enter the phone number of the person you would want emergency services personnel to contact if you are unable to speak for yourself.

If you would like more than one **ICE** entry, you can enter **ICE1**, **ICE2**, **ICE3**, etc. for all the contacts you wish to list.

**I.C.E. your cell,
police say**

In emergency, this code identifies key phone numbers

A man had a heart attack recently at a theme park in Gurnee, sending emergency workers scrambling to find someone to notify because he was unable to communicate and had no identification with him.

He did have a cellular phone, and Gurnee Fire Chief Fred Friedl said workers dialed dozens of numbers to locate a family member.

"Between our personnel and the park personnel trying to track down his family in the park, it took a considerable amount of time," he said. "This has become a typical situation where the vast majority of times people carry their cell phone but other identification they may not have."

Now there's a simple idea spreading across the nation to help in such situations.

Cell-phone users are asked to program into their phones the names and numbers of people they want contacted preceded by the acronym I.C.E., for "in case of emergency." That way, if paramedics and emergency personnel locate a cell phone, they can contact someone right away..."
